Subject:

Firstly, I would like to thank you for your willingness to engage with your local community, and for listening to the many voices who have spoken so passionately about Cooper Park Tennis. Prior to these meetings, it is possible that many of you were unaware of the importance many community members place on this unique facility.

The reactions to the second tender outcome reflect a concern that awarding the tender to a larger organization, which is not necessarily invested in this community, undermines the inclusion of community engagement in the tender itself. Awarding only 5% to this very important element, seemed to be paying lip service to its inclusion, rather than a genuine attempt to assess each tenderer for their commitment to this community.

I believe that a small/medium enterprise committed to local residents and the broader tennis community will serve the community better than a large organization. From experience, the incumbent has certainly demonstrated a sustained commitment to the local community, and honoring the arrangements for Friday night social tennis from the previous leaseholder reflects this. Young Aces has also provided verbal assurance that they would continue both the Friday night and Monday morning socials and reiterated their commitment to supporting this community.

I would respectfully request that the community needs be prioritised, and I support Councillors' decision made at the meeting on 2 April 2024 not to award to the preferred tenderer.

I live across the road from Coopper Park Tennis Courts and have been a regular player for the past 30 years approximately - playing each weekend and also having a weekly tennis lesson. Its a community there and the current operators are very much part of that.

I heard with disappointment that the Tender for running the Cooper Park Tennis courts has been awarded to a partnership of untested ability - primarily based on the extra \$40k rent that Woollahra Council would collect.

This to me is a travesty based on the wrong guidelines.

I would have preferred a more professional approach where all credentials were considered - the ability to run a unique tennis facility as this successfully, the extent of local community engagement, and intentions to retain all the courts and maintain them at the same or better standard.

The incumbents have a proven track record which appears to have been undermined in its significance.

I am horrified to read that the successful tenderer will be running the courts for up to 14 years before the position will be up for tender again. Are you unable to end the tender if your outcome is based more on revenue than any of these other important considerations, particularly if the new operator turns out to be much worse than what we have enjoyed for so long to date?

No one will ever get rich by running these courts. Their hourly commitment would have to be costed at sub \$20 per hour to make the numbers stack up profitably. Its a marginal business and the new operators are destined to financially fail if they have to pay an extra \$40k on top of the current rate.

I urge you to leave well enough alone unless you are utterly convinced that the new operators will not cut back on all the other cost factors in order to trade successfully.

Having attended high school in the East in the 80s, resided for over 20 years in Bondi, and been a passionate tennis player committed to improving my technique and game I know the courts in the area very well and have played on all of them.

In my experience of tennis both in Australia and internationally, from tennis centre to centre there is always a patent feel - call it a culture - that is palpable when you first walk in and get to know more deeply with each re-visit. With this "centre culture" in mind, two managers stand out: Stephen Day of Trumper Park and a previous manager of Cooper Park (from over ten years ago) Apollo Kanakis. In my view, both demonstrate an unprecedented style, warmth, and commitment to youth tennis and tennis coaching plus ongoing improvement for adults. It would be a loss for Cooper Park and the area if neither tender succeeded.

In terms of Stephen Day, I have had the pleasure of experiencing Wentworth for the last six years having become disenchanted with another centre in the East where I previously played weekly for 8 years (for reasons outlined in the paragraph above). Stephen's management of Wentworth is first class. Fundamentals like the court surface and general quality are supreme, plus the online court booking system is excellent saving time for the customer (and demonstrating some of the fundamentals of good retail operations), but more importantly, far beyond that has been the selection of coaches and the clear criteria of the selection applied to the hiring process. I've been coached there twice a week throughout. My technique, game, and pleasure of the hit have never been better and I'm grateful to Stephen for providing such a stellar and thoughtful offering.

Too often in the East and with tennis generally, the offering becomes patently commercial and profit-driven at the expense of the feel of the game, without which deprives the community of a joy that is already rare and in jeopardy, particularly these days. I strongly encourage the decision-makers to keep this in mind when making their decision.

Dear Mr Marolia,

I am writing to respectfully request Councils consideration to proceed with the original recommendation of the Finance, Community & Services Committee, 02 April 2024.

Sydney Sports Management Group Voyager Operations (SSMGVT) is a tried and tested value-based community organisation. The Directors and CEO are family orientated community minded citizens. The CEO sits on two Eastern Suburbs NFP's (Chairman – Sydney East Special Olympics, Secretary - WNOW (Men's Wellness Group). He also coaches special needs tennis every Thursday at Heffron Park. He is local to the area and would be the dedicated contact point for Council should SSMGVT be chosen to operate this important community asset.

We acknowledge and respect the passion of the tennis community who attended and spoke at the meeting. However, a number of speaker's chose to omit the or misrepresented the relevant facts causing reputational damage and creating a negative perception to the Councillors.

Some of the items that were misrepresented include:

- SSMGVT is not a franchise or a conglomerate.
- Our Capital bid was not dodgy as communicated.
- Rushcutters Bay Tennis Centre is not disgusting and dirty, we would not be referenced by City of Sydney if this was the case. The decking does require replacing and this is a City of Sydney capital expense and therefore not a dereliction of our management duties.
- We are not a faceless organisation. In fact, the Directors and CEO all very hands on providing tennis coaching lessons on a weekly basis.

# Quite the contrary is the case as evidenced below by our multi-award-winning programs:

- 2017 Tennis Australia Newcombe Medal Coaching Excellence
- 2018 NSW Tennis Club of the Year Chatswood Tennis Club,
- 2019 World School Championships (5<sup>th</sup>)
- 2019 Tennis NSW School of the Year McDonald College
- 2019 Tennis NSW Most Outstanding Club Finalist North Manly
- 2021 Tennis NSW Most Outstanding Club Finalist Heffron Tennis Centre

- 2022 Tennis Australia Newcombe Medal Winner Luke Bourgeois
- 2022 Tennis NSW Most Outstanding Club Finalist Heffron Tennis Centre
- 2023 Tennis NSW Finalist Outstanding Inclusion Initiative SMASH Tennis

Young Aces Tennis Pty Ltd gathered several representatives on Tuesday evening who were instructed to slander, misrepresent, and attempt to disqualify our organisation from the tender process. We retained our composure and professionalism and as a result the councillors only heard one side of the story which is extremely unfair and unethical. We will be instructing our lawyer's to commence proceedings against Young Aces Pty Ltd for the reputational and business damage incurred as a result of their actions.

#### Engendering a sense of community

The meeting had vigorous discussion surrounding the topic of "engendering a sense of community". SSMGVT values the importance of building inclusive community hubs as evidenced throughout our tender submission. Within 3 months of transition, we will ensure the completion of both 6.11 User Engagement, Tennis Centre User Consultation Plan and will also collaborate with Tennis NSW to complete the Tennis NSW venue audit.

We our passionate about building community hubs, a 3<sup>rd</sup> place for the community to connect. I was previously the Head of Commercial for the for the YMCA over a 7-year period. We operated over 200 facilities in NSW / ACT.

The scale of the organisation did not stop us creating local community hubs managed by employees not business owners or directors. Therefore, we refute the premise communicated by speakers on Tuesday evening that you must be a small family operator to deliver community friendly facilities. I have taken the YMCA learnings and implemented them into SSMGVT operations as evidence throughout our tender submission.

We are a community-based organisation as evidence by the Local Government Authority references including City of Sydney, City of Willoughby, City of Ryde, Tennis NSW Awards and the testimonials from community-based organisation included in the Appendix section of our tender response.

We will ensure Cooper Park is an inclusive facility for all people and all ages.

#### Community Access and Inclusion

We are committed to access for all as evidenced through the management of our existing facilities including:

- Special Olympic Tennis at Tennis World North Ryde and Heffron Park
- We partner with NOVA disability employment employing staff with intellectual disabilities with placements at Willis Park and Tennis World North Ryde
- Hosting regular LGBTQIA+ events in partnership with Tennis Sydney.
- In partnership with Tennis NSW and Special Olympics we administered the SO NSW State Tennis Championships at Cintra Park Tennis Centre
- We partnered with Tennis Sydney, LGBTQIA+ and Tennis NSW in the delivery of the World Pride Open Gay tournament.

# Community Investment (Tender Bid)

 We will support a local school with free weekly coaching as is the case at Rushcutters Bay Tennis centre with the Plunkett Street Public School.

- Our tender includes an adopt a school program with a reference provided from the principal of Plunkett Street school Woolloomooloo. The program provides free tennis coaching, court hire and bus transportation amounting to circa \$20K+ per annum.
- SMASH mental wellbeing tennis program which was nominated for the 2023 Tennis NSW Access and Inclusion award. We will administer 4x10 week free SMASH mental health program.
- We will provide free and reduced logistical EV bus transportation to schools and camp participants through the NSBC Group.

#### Community Programming (Tender Bid)

**Community Championships** – replicate the Rushcutters Bay Tennis Centre annual Community Tennis Championships that is open for all community members. In 2023, we received 242 applicants entering the competitions that caters for all ages and skill levels. This community initiative will be replicated at Coopers Park.

**Junior Hotshots Tournament - SSMGVT** managed facilities administer quarterly Junior Hotshots tournament for local children to compete against one another for prizes and trophies. The tournaments are designed for students who are enrolled in our Hotshots programs to challenge themselves with all the coaching they have received over the term.

In addition, we administer Friday night Junior Competition through the Term and also provide a complimentary BBQ for the competitors and for their parents. It is our commitment to grassroots tennis and the promotion of junior tennis. We will commence these initiatives should SSMGVO be successful with our tender bid.

**Social Tennis -** Community Connection is established through weekly sessions. Social Tennis at Rushcutters Bay Tennis + Café continues to be very popular with social held 3 x sessions per week. We ensure that a tennis coach staff member is allocated to each social session who provides administration support and ensures everyone involved has an equal amount of matches. Should we be successful with the Cooper Park tender we will replicate this successful model. We will maintain the existing Friday night social.

**Annual Open Day -** We will administer an Australia Open Tennis Day where the courts open to the community for free, with free coaching also available for both juniors and adults, with a complimentary BBQ provided to all community members.

#### Examples In Action (Can be replicated at Cooper Park after completing user survey)

Organisations and groups for older people and older individuals - The Man Walk - Heffron Park Tennis Centre continues to support 'The Man Walk' group which connects and supports men whilst walking and talking. The group starts off and finishes off at Heffron Park Tennis Centre 2 x mornings per week. The walk is then followed up by free coffee and group chat at our facility.

Young people and youth related organisations - Youth Off The Streets (YOTS) - Heffron Park Tennis Centre offers a subsidised tennis program, where we provide access to tennis court hire, a tennis coach and equipment. Each week circa 10-15 students participate in the coaching session. YOTS is a community organisation that helps disadvantaged young people that experience immense personal trauma, such as being homeless, drug dependent and/or recovering from abuse.

**Member's Christmas Lunch (Chatswood Tennis Club) -** We also build community through organising a lunch with the club for circa 100+ members.

**BBQs** - We have regular BBQs at all our managed facilities on Saturday mornings and at the end of the evening competitions terms. This provides an excellent opportunity to connect with each other of the court.

**Ladies Clinic Thursday Morning** – we provided a free Christmas lunch to the 16 ladies who attend weekly. They usually relax with coffee after their clinic each week.

**Social Sunday** - up to 80 members attend Chatswood every Sunday and we administer the schedule and BBQ.

**Night Competition** – we administer weekly competitions across all our partner venues and enjoy a BBQ and social connection at the end of each term.

#### The Process

SSMGVT submitted two tenders to Council, engaged in two meetings to clarify Council's queries, and attended two Council meetings in person. We scored the highest on both tenders based on Council's tender criteria and being recommended on two occasions by the Council tender panel and on the second submission by the panel with a probity consultant engaged. We have a 30-year proven track record of delivering to Sydney communities and Local Government Authorities.

We followed due process and compliance with the local government tendering act, we have not contacted Councillors during the tender process. We submitted all additional requests and queries to Council in a timely manner.

#### We did not:

- 1. Engage in a negative reputationally damaging propaganda campaign.
- 2. Misrepresent other bidders on social media.
- 3. Defame and make inaccurate allegations in a public Council meeting.
- 4. Load the gallery with our staff member, (eg) Mike Etherington (Head Coach Rushcutters Bay Tennis centre 11 Years employed), community ambassadors, school Principals and loyal tennis customers.

We are an organisation that respects community and partnerships. We respected all speakers on both occasions. This was not reciprocated by the other bidders and some of the public. I personally felt intimated and under attack and therefore it was difficult to gather my thoughts and respond in a succinct manner. We work tirelessly to build our reputation and have found this tender process incredibly challenging.

Right of Reply – Given the derogatory and inaccurate comments communicated in relation to Rushcutters Bay Tennis Centre & Café, our fully costed capital plan and the impact on our brand, we believe it is a fair and reasonable request to have a right of reply so we can set the record straight and protect our hard-earned reputation.

#### Request

We are seeking legal advice and have concerns that Young Aces tender submission could be deemed <u>non-compliant</u> with respect to Schedule D and proven experience in delivering large scale capital projects. Therefore, we request Council to proceed with the original recommendation that will provide Council, ratepayers and the community with an enhanced community hub and an improved financial position.

We suggest Young Access is an untested entity and Cooper Park should not be a testing ground for Will Skeggs and Brian Gaitz to collaborate. It would be a risk to test a new operating model at such a significant facility on a 14-year lease.

They have not operated an 8-court venue and do not have appropriate experience including Local Government tennis facility management and capital works project management.

Compliance with Schedule D – Tenders shall provide details of three contracts or agreements of a similar nature with relevant referees.

- o Similar nature 8 Court tennis complex with fully catered café
- Young Aces manage the coaching program <u>only</u> not the community asset as this is managed by the Belrose Tennis Club.
- o Belrose Coaching Program is only 4 courts.
- o Bondi Tennis Centre (Brian Gaitz) is only a 3-court facility.

Should Council decide to enter direct negotiations with Young Aces we respectfully request that we should also be allowed to negotiate and suggest the following inclusions as part of the negotiation.

### **Direct Negotiation**

- Community KPI's We absolutely support this position. This is the case with the operation of Rushcutters Bay Tennis Centre City of Sydney who has recently extended our lease because we delivered on the community KPI's over a 5 year period.
- Quarterly Reporting and KPI review as is the case with City of Willougby (Willis Park
   15 court complex) ensure adherence to lease.
- Justification of the capital expenditure bid and evidence of operator's ability to execute major capital works projects.
- Proven Transition capability deliver business continuity evidenced by references to ensure the Cooper Park tennis community is not disrupted with a change in management and programming. This is extremely resource intensive and we have the capacity, capability and proven experience.
- Child safety a thorough review of the organisations child safety policies, systems, and framework with consideration to the 10 Child Safe Standards and ensuring they are embedded in organisational leadership, governance and culture.
- We would also request Councillor's and Council staff attend site tours of SSMGVT operated facilities, meet our staff, and communicate with our Council partners.
- Independent Financial Score Card ensure bidders can deliver on the significant capital investment required and will sign capital and lease guarantees.

To clarify we are certainly not a conglomerate and a faceless organisation as was suggested by a number of the speakers last night. We are a midsize value-based organisation that has the head of a corporate and the heart of a community organisation. As a midsize organisation we have the benefits of economies of scale, supplier buying power, excellent governance and are not single point dependent.

We would appreciate the opportunity to speak at Monday night's Council meeting so Scott Riley (Managing Director) – 30 Years experience operating community tennis facilities and Luke Bourgeois (Director) - 2022 Tennis Australia Newcombe Medal Winner be provided the opportunity to set the record straight and protect our reputation.

Finally, we will be administering a community tennis competition this Sunday at Heffron Park with 60 beginners and intermediate players attending. This is an all-day event including lunch and a prize ceremony. I would like to invite any interested Councillors to attend and would value the opportunity to show them first-hand how we build social capital within our managed facilities thus removing the negative perception that was created on Tuesday night.

Moreover, I am aware of at least one other court that the SSMG Group manages (I believe they manage tens of sporting centres), which are kept in very poor condition, with day to day tennis-staff that are not experienced. I am sure there are many things that larger corporations can do better than smaller local operators, however, I believe that managing eight tennis courts in Cooper Park, as a 'community asset' is one better done by local operators focused on the success of one centre as 'their baby'

To whom it may concern.

It is my understanding that the council meeting of 8/4/24 will be discussing a recommendation to award the tender for the Cooper Park tennis centre to a group called Young Aces. If this is so then I would like Council to know that I like a number of other people have some concerns regarding this recommendation.

At a previous meeting of Council where another earlier recommendation was discussed members of the public let it be known very clearly that they wanted this tender to go to a local operator and they were led to believe that a 2nd tender process would take place and that local community concerns would be considered when making the next award.

It would seem that community expectations were not heavily considered as this section counted for a lowly 5% of the total point score and all applicants were given a full 5% upfront effectively eliminating this requirement completely. It would be like a handicap race where everybody is given a 5 meter head start.

I am not in a position to know what examination was made regarding the other areas considered. I assume that the expertise of the applicants in actually running the centre to a high standard was looked at as this will be the most important thing in the coming years. It's not much good giving the tender to the group which offers the most money if it transpires that they lack the experience or know how to get the job done.

It would appear that the incumbent team has not been considered. Given that they have been there many years and have run the centre to a very high standard generating a huge amount of public support I for one find this quite puzzling. Both Dieter Wilhelmi and Dr Sarah Morante PhD have vast experience and qualifications when it comes to coaching and have demonstrated by their actions over many years that they know how to manage a facility safely and effectively.

In the next few years a lot of capitol works will be conducted at the centre amongst them new fencing, resurfacing the courts and installing new lights to mention but a few. Dieter and Sarah have done these things in the past, there is no doubt they would be able to do them again. Is this true of others, have they shown by action and not merely by a statement on a piece of paper that they will be able to perform these tasks.

If the only real consideration in this recommendation to council is money and not ability then the expectations of the community and those of us who love this facility and enjoy the time we spend here will not be met. Even if the offers amount to 40-50K extra and I doubt they would differ by much more than that, such a paltry sum which wouldn't even pay for 1 council employee will not compensate for what we lose if the high bidder turns out to be unable to run it to the same standard we currently enjoy.

I strongly urge Council to consider all factors involved and make a decision based on merit and not the holy dollar, to do anything else will be a bitter disappointment to the community.

As a longstanding and regular user of Cooper Park - both its tennis facilities and parklands - I believe the process for awarding the new lease for the Cooper Park tennis courts be postponed.

I wish the incumbent Cooper Park Tennis Team to continue to lease the Cooper Park site as a tennis club. They have built a loyal and wonderful local community asset that works in concert with the surroundings of a rare local asset. As a user, I have not seen anything from Council or the tenderers to show how there will be any improvements by other lessees.

The current team themselves are local and entrenched in the community. It is clear a number of the tenderers have no local bona fides.

BUT I'm concerned by the undue haste with which this process is being decided, particularly the distribution of the agenda for an April 2 meeting on Easter Monday.

Incredibly, this decision is being made while Council's public consultation for Cooper Park is ongoing (we are yet to see the first draft or be able to comment on it). Why? Surely the tennis courts are a major part of the Park's future?

Also, is there any transparency about why the Woollahra Council's Finance, Community & Services Committee overturned - in secret and quickly - their recommendation for Sydney Sport Management Group (SSMG) / Voyager Tennis Academy as the preferred tenderer, and instead recommended Young Aces last Tuesday?

How did all tenderers receive full marks for the community engagement component of the tender, considering not one of the other tenderers has made contact with, or been seen, by users of Copper Park (Cooper Park Tennis has made contact and discussed the process)?

Why is there no transparency about capex?

This appears to be a shallow cash-grab by the council in which the tenderer offering the highest rent is being chosen. This process does not appear to satisfy good governance and, in fact, raise a number of issues about Council conduct worthy of further investigation.

Obviously, the first effect of awarding the lease to the highest bidder will be higher prices to rent courts. Also, what guarantees are there that the courts will not be used for other higher-yielding commercial purposes, including non-tennis events?

If nothing else, any decision - particularly on a 7-year lease which appears to have no impediment to being triggered to 14-years - should be withheld until Council releases its draft consultation report on the future of Cooper Park.

We are writing this email to endorse the incumbent operator of the Cooper Park tennis courts (lead by Dieter Wilhelmi) in regards to the current tender for the next 14 years, being voted on in the meeting tomorrow.

As we understand it, a major factor in decision is the financial offering, with 'consumer engagement' again receiving a mere 5% weighting. Did the Council not learn anything from the ill-fated attempt to turn the courts into a multi-sports facility several months ago?! Cooper park and its tennis courts are a community treasure, and any potential changes should vary a much higher community engagement weighting if changes are to be made with the support of your council's residents versus the angst when we are effectively excluded.

The current operators have run the courts well for many years and are effectively part of the local tennis community.

As we understand it they have committed to investing considerable capital expenditure to upgrade the courts, fences and cafe and adding solar power aligning with the Council's 2030 net zero target.

Whilst no doubt competing tenders would also have committed similar offerings plus presumably higher tender offers, not everything should be about money. The incumbents have a proven track-record with thriving community engagement and effectively running the courts for the past 17 years. If it isn't broken, don't fix it!

As far as we are aware the competing tenders are not local (a Belrose organisation partnering with Bondi Tennis is not really local, nor are SSMG/Voyager), so there is a high risk that a non-local operator would run it purely with profit as a motivating factor with local / community aspect not factored in.

Please consider choosing tender of the incumbent operator of the Cooper Park tennis courts (lead by Dieter Wilhelmi) as the successful choice in the upcoming tender decision.

I've been following the Cooper Park Tennis Centre tender very closely and note with interest that you have overturned the recommendation for Voyager and are now recommending Young Aces.


I applaud council for making this move as I believe a small business operator is better suited for the Cooper Park tennis community.

Dear All,

As a long time resident of Woollahra, I am writing to express my surprise and extreme concern at the tender process relating to Cooper Park Tennis Courts.

I watched the meeting that considered the Council's Finance, Community & Services tenderer recommendation of Sydney Sports Management/Voyager on 6 November, 2023. The Councillors' refused to follow the recommendation and decided to restart the tender process, requiring multi-sports to be excluded and insisting that local community interests be taken into account in the subsequent tender process.

Last week, I watched as the Council's Finance, Community & Services tenderer recommendation was again overturned and the Young Aces group from Belrose (affiliated with Bondi Tennis) recommended in their place. The exclusion of multi-sports remains somewhat ambiguous and the requirement to take into account the local community interest was not handled the way it was intended by Council at the original meeting. Tenderers were merely required to pay lip service to the important notion of community interest in their responses and ironically all tenderers scored the maximum of a paltry 5%. This was very disappointing to the local community.

It was very clear from both the discussion and listening to the questions that many of those around the table at the council meeting last week had not read the tender responses and had little real understanding of the tenderers or what it takes to operate a tennis centre. And yet, that did not stop those present from switching from one large corporate tenderer to another non-local one based on a high-level and largely uninformed and misinformed discussion.

I say all this without meaning any disrespect whatsoever to anyone present at the meetings. I know the workload and timeframes are rigorous. And I would like to add that I thought the decision not to recommend Sydney Sports Management/Voyager was indeed the correct one. Their dominant grip on some 20 plus tennis centres in the Sydney area, combined with their lack of local community knowledge is of real concern.

Moreover, a large number of local residents, including myself, prefer that the tender not be awarded to Young Aces. They have no experience with the local community. The local Cooper Park and broader Woollahra community would like a group with local, hands-on knowledge and experience in place. We strongly and overwhelmingly prefer the incumbent operator Dieter Wilhelmi and his first class team who have proven themselves so well over the period they have been operating Cooper Park Tennis courts. This must be very clear to Council based on the turnout of residents at both meetings and the volume of correspondence it has received.

Given the demonstrated division and indecision within Council, combined with the enormous support Council has witnessed for the incumbent operator, it would seem prudent at the very least to take a step back and restart the tender process and get it really right this time. Before awarding a 14 year lease (7+7) for this unique tennis centre in Woollahra, it is incumbent on Council to ensure it has left no stone unturned in making the right decision. It needs to de-risk the chance of making a hasty, uninformed decision that has not adequately included local community input.

The present incumbent ticks all those boxes and more. Change for the sake of change and making the bottom line the ultimate criterion are risk-laden approaches that drive negative behaviour.

I urge Council to take the difficult but in my opinion correct and fair decision to restart the tender process and this time with real community input in the process. This is lacking with the current tenants. With 2 children (ages 5 and 2) it is very exciting to see this new operator really cater to that.
- 2. No classes. I see on Young Aces a fantastic schedule my children would definitely participate in: https://www.classhub.com.au/provider/youngaces/2024/1 - the current tennants are more focused on the older residents I think vs young.
- 3. The website of young aces is fantastic, very engaging for the whole community.
- 4. Services like restringing I believe are not offered by the current tenants.
- 5. For adults the focus has definitely been on the older side of the community. For those in their 20's, 30's or 40's there is no information around how to find similarly skilled players to compete with? Competitions, ladderboard etc. I would love to participate but it's just the 'same old crowd' I think those who control things with no real interest in starting a dynamic leaderboard and meeting players of all ages and different levels of skill. I get it and they have a great club, but it's a little exclusionary.
- 6. There has been no cooked food at the cafe for 1+ years. It used to be one of my favourite places to go for breakfast. I understand due to the uncertainly over the last year perhaps a cook wasn't hired after the last left. But it has been a LONG time without a chef in SUCH a beautiful spot. Their previous chef really was good, incredible simple breakfasts - it was a shame they left. Would love for him to return!

One thing about the current tennis cafe - I love it - hopefully that beautiful guiet air doesn't change about the place. It's such a lovely spot. That's something I hope doesn't change.

Dear distinguished members of the Council,

It is with a heavy heart that I address you to express my profound disappointment in the conduct of our elected representatives and the administrative staff of the Woollahra Council ("Council"). Recent developments surrounding consecutive flawed tenders (SC7193 and SC7818) and the subsequent processes have deeply troubled the local community. These issues have been brought to light in the documented tender and lease, recent Council meetings, documented in meeting minutes, and outlined in the recent Privity Report.

In 2016, the Council valiantly fought against the merger of local councils, rallying behind the community in a battle for survival. Yet, in 2024, that same spirit of unity and protection seems conspicuously absent as the Council has embarked on a distressing course of action. The decision to proceed with two deeply flawed tenders, endangering the existence of the cherished 100-year-old community tennis centre, is a betrayal of the trust placed in the Council by the diverse and loyal residents it serves.

Drawing upon my extensive experience as a successful businessman involved in tender bids across various government levels, I am compelled to highlight the critical importance of community consultation and participation in such endeavours. The Council should have prioritised understanding community expectations and concerns before structuring the tenders. Properly structured tenders with equitable specifications, clear KPIs, and a rigorous qualifying process would have separated genuine contenders from mere pretenders.

During the recent Council meeting, the dismissal of SSMG Voyager and the subsequent appointment of Young Aces after protracted open and confidential deliberations underscored a concerning lack of clarity and informed decision-making. It appears that this decision was more of a compromise to mitigate a challenging situation rather than a well-considered resolution. I firmly believe that the

Council should have reconsidered and restarted the tender process to ensure a fair and professional outcome.

My apprehension towards Young Aces' bid stems from its ostentatious financial offer, which raises serious doubts about its viability and long-term sustainability. Will their aggressive investment strategy, prioritising coaching over community access and sustainability, truly serve the best interests of our diverse tennis community? Moreover, their association with Belrose Tennis Centre, known for its coaching-only services, raises concerns about their suitability to manage our cherished tennis centre (references: <a href="https://play.tennis.com.au/BelroseTennisClub">https://play.tennis.com.au/BelroseTennisClub</a> and <a href="https://bonditennis.com.au/about/">https://bonditennis.com.au/about/</a>).

Upon further scrutiny, it becomes evident that significant shortcomings exist within the tender and lease arrangements, warranting immediate attention. The Privity Report, while highlighting financial aspects such as rent (40%), capital expenditure (10%), business plan (10%), and financial capacity (5%), lacks comprehensive information on other essential evaluation criteria. This disproportionate emphasis on financial metrics suggests a concerning disregard for broader community concerns, which constitute the remaining 35% of evaluation criteria not addressed in the report. Furthermore, the recent Council meeting revealed that a mere 5% allocation was made for community interests, a stark departure from the Council's purported commitment to community engagement. Such a disregard for community priorities is deeply regrettable and merits urgent rectification.

I implore the Council to revisit its decisions and safeguard the community's interests with the same fervour demonstrated during the 2016 merger dispute. Transparency, accountability, and genuine commitment to community expectations must guide your actions. Should the Council choose to proceed with the tender process, I stand ready to provide detailed insights into the aforementioned shortcomings and ambiguities.

In conclusion, I urge you to vote against awarding the tender to Young Aces and instead consider a fresh start, ensuring that the process is fair, transparent, equitable, and in the best interests of our cherished community.

- 7. They are a category killer and am sure their strategy is to secure Cooper Park, Trumper Park and Lynn Park.

I would implore the selection committee councilors go and inspect some of their facilities before making the wrong decision.

Dear Councillors,

I am writing to you all as part of our heart-felt, final plea to reconsider your position regarding the future management of the Cooper Park tennis courts.

Tennis has been a major part of my life since the age of 5. Throughout my junior years I lived and breathed tennis as a national-level competitor. At 15 years of age, I began coaching on a voluntary basis, which soon transitioned into a part-time job that helped me throughout my school and university studies. Almost 40 years after first picking up a racquet, tennis is still the core focus of my life. And a large part of this is the Cooper Park tennis courts.

In 2007, I had just completed a PhD (funded by the International Tennis Federation to establish heat guidelines for the Grand Slams) and was a full-time academic at The University of Sydney. This was also when I also started coaching part-time at Cooper Park and helping the Lessees to run the coaching program. I quickly fell in love with both the Park and the people. And before too long, Cooper Park Tennis became my sole focus.

For the past 17 years, with Dieter Wilhelmi, I have been involved in the daily operations of the business – from coaching tennis to making coffees to cleaning the toilets to sitting down with other players and park users for a chat. Over this time, the Cooper Park tennis courts have become my home, and the people who frequent the courts and café have become my family. This is at the heart of our approach to the management of the Cooper Park tennis courts. It's our life. A life that we've chosen and loved every single day of the past 17 years. But that's not to say our management has been a "soft" one that merely focusses on people.

Over the past 17 years, we have built Cooper Park tennis courts into a thriving tennis facility — one of the best community tennis centres in the country. Being long-time Woollahra residents as well as spending each and every day working at Cooper Park, we have an intimate understanding of community characteristics and desires, which has enabled us to shape the direction of the operation accordingly. In particular, we have ensured casual court hire has remained the cornerstone of the business. This not only meets demand but also the spirit of being an open and inclusive community facility. We have provided a highly experienced tennis coaching program with incomparable continuity among the coaches — something that is enormously appreciated by customers. Additionally, we provide adult and children's competitions, school holiday tennis camps, events and social tennis — and most recently, the 100th anniversary of the Cooper Park Tennis courts.

In 2007, we gave the historic pavilion the upgrade it deserved and introduced the café, which has become a greater asset than we could ever have anticipated. It has become the heart of the Cooper Park community. It's has brought together children from various schools across the local area to make new friendships through tennis camps, lessons and competitions. It's a place where mothers have a hit and coffee after dropping their kids at school. Where groups of retirees enjoy a weekly social doubles event and morning tea. Where neighbours can stop in for a morning coffee or afternoon ice-cream as they walk through the park with their dog. Where teens and young adults have progressed from being students to holding their first job in our café. Or where an art class, using the park as their muse, can take a peaceful lunch break.

Cooper Park Tennis has reliably paid its rent to Council along will all other outgoings and requirements needed to stay in operation. We have completed \$987,508.30 of entirely self-funded capital works, which included two rounds of

court resurfacing, two total upgrades of court lighting, and the establishment of the café. We have also invested in a strict maintenance program for the courts and cafe with ongoing minor upgrades where required (e.g., fence repairs to manage subsidence and the refurbishment of the tennis court cabanas).

Back in 2007, Cooper Park Tennis did **not** propose the highest rental offer of the tender process. However, Council wisely put this criterion into perspective and valued our broader offering. The impeccable track-record of Cooper Park Tennis' operation has proven Council made a good decision in 2007 — we have delivered on all we promised in our tender and all that Council demanded. We have exceeded all expectations in having developed such a strong and thriving community at Cooper Park. Council can view the unprecedented level of support for our continued management as a commendation for their decision to appoint us operators of Cooper Park tennis courts as much as a plea for us to continue.

We urge Councillors to adopt the same broader perspective as their predecessors did in 2007. Please note what an effective and reliable partner we have been to Council over the past 17 years, and how we can offer the same trust and security for both Council and the community into the future. Also please consider our rental offer for more than the 40% weighting that significantly determined tender rankings. We ask you to factor social capital (an invaluable asset in any business and most especially, a local Council) into your decision-making. Creating and maintaining a community comes with a cost that is reflected in the bottom line of a business — as it has done in our rental offer. However, the time and money spent on community is not really a cost. It is an investment. The value of community and social capital may not fit into a balance sheet — but maybe the truly important things in life don't. Sadly, for all concerned, community and the social capital it brings is now a rare commodity. It takes considerable time and care to build yet can be destroyed overnight. This is a very real possibility for the Cooper Park tennis community. So, it is very important that Councillors consider the value of social capital, and what it takes to create and maintain alongside the clear need for financial return. As with all investments and life in general, it is a trade-off. Cooper Park Tennis proposes a slightly lower rental than some other tenderers but is a sure bet. Not only will rent be paid and capital works be delivered, the invaluable community will remain in the safe hands that created it.

I'm a very regular user of Cooper Park tennis courts, using the courts between 2 and 3 times per week for the last 10 years. Together with my friends, family and colleagues, we have spent a large amount of time at the courts.

I would like the current Cooper Park tennis team of Dieter Wilhelmi & Sarah Morante to continue to lease the Cooper Park courts as a tennis venue and club.

Over the years, they have nurtured a loyal, friendly and tennis-minded community, and are well respected by the community. The current team themselves are local and involved in the community.

<u>Personally</u>, I'm concerned by the haste with which this process is being decided.

As a player and client of the courts, I have not seen anything from Council or the tenderers to show how there will be any improvements by other lessees.

This decision seems to being made while Council's public consultation for Cooper Park is ongoing. Why? Aren't the courts are a major part of the Park's future?

I am concerned by the % rating system by which the tender is being assessed.

- For instance, how can the Rental component be granted 40% whereas Financial Viability and Capacity be only 5%?
- Furthermore, how can all tenderers receive full marks (5%) for the community engagement component of the tender, yet to my knowledge, not one of the other tenderers has made contact with, or been seen, by users of Cooper Park?
- Why is there no transparency about the capital improvements, both scope and cost for the courts.
- What is the reason Woollahra Council's Finance, Community & Services Committee overturned their recommendation for Sydney Sport Management Group (SSMG) / Voyager Tennis Academy as the preferred tenderer, and instead recommended Young Aces last Tuesday?

Placing so much emphasis on the amount of rent seems to be just a play to get as much money in as possible, and nothing about the tennis. These courts have been here a 100 years. Let's not get caught up in the very short termist thinking of rent maximizing as opposed to the long term health, viability of the local tennis community

This whole process does not appear to satisfy good governance with the aim of creating <u>high standard and quality tennis courts for the local community</u> and raises issues about Council conduct, potentially needing further investigation.

The Tender process failed last time for the similar reasons.

This is major decision for Cooper Park and a wonderful tennis centre, that will endure for 14 years.

Please reconsider the Tender for the benefit of all, and particularly the Cooper Park tennis community.

I understand Woollahra Council's Finance, Community & Services Committee have changed their preferred tenderer for Cooper Park Tennis Courts from Sydney Sport Management Group (SSMG)/Voyager Tennis Academy to Young Aces/Bondi Tennis. I would like to express my concerns about the committee's decision to recommend this new tenderer and implore the Council to award the tender to the current operators.

From what I know of Young Aces and Bondi Tennis, while they do cater for adults their focus is mainly on children. Young Aces' Instagram and Facebook pages advertise adult lessons, however, these sites clearly focus on programs targeting young children. The inclusive demographic at Cooper Park Tennis includes children, families, young adults and a significant contingency of older adults and retirees. I play regularly at Cooper Park and often see players of all ages coming and going. These people know Dieter Wilhelmi and Sarah Morante by name and vice versa. The team at Cooper Park recently held a celebration to commemorate Cooper Park's 100<sup>th</sup> birthday. I was amazed at how many people turned up, not just to celebrate the birthday, but to show their support for the team that runs it.

I'm sure you are aware of Dieter and Sarah's extensive experience and credentials that more than qualify them to manage the operations and coaching at Cooper Park Tennis Courts. I would like to share a personal story to demonstrate their caring and passion for the tennis community, which I believe is a significant differentiator. Sarah started coaching my daughter a few years ago. My daughter's dream was to make the Tildesley tennis team at her school. The Tildesley Shield Tennis Tournament is run by the Independent Girls Schools Sporting Association (IGSA Sport) and is the ultimate aim for the girls who play tennis with the school. My daughter shared her goal with Sarah, so Sarah made it her goal to develop the technical and psychological aspects of my daughter's game. From day one it was abundantly clear that Sarah cared and wanted to help my daughter achieve her goal. She gave her strategies and recommended drills to practice, videos to watch, players to keep an eye on. On a few occasions, Sarah took the time to watch my daughter play school competitions to see how she managed her nerves in a match (this was something they had been working on). Sarah didn't have to do this on her day off, but she did because she cared. She wanted my daughter to be successful. On one occasion, I was hitting with my daughter at Cooper Park and afterwards Dieter pulled me aside and gave me suggestions on how I could hit with her more effectively to allow her to practice her technique. At the time, Dieter didn't know me very well and certainly didn't have to speak to me, but he did because he cared about her and her goals as a tennis player. It took some time, but my daughter earned a place on the Tildesley team and performed very well in the tournament. I have no doubt that her success was in large part a result of her working with Sarah.

I have seen similar care displayed by Sarah when coaching other players, ranging from young children to elderly players. The current team at Cooper Park are 100% dedicated to understanding the needs of their clientele, to helping them achieve their goals, whatever they may be, and to preserving the close community and tranquil environment at Cooper Park. And the local community categorically reciprocates this dedication. Throughout the bid process for Cooper Park Tennis Courts, community support has remained strong. The community feels strongly that Dieter, Sarah, and their team are the right people to manage and operate Cooper Park Tennis Courts and should be awarded the tender.

This return to the local community is rare and invaluable. In relation to the Council's evaluation criteria, a return to the local community should be valued higher than a purely monetary return. Dieter and Sarah have proven they can provide both, as can be seen from their 27 years of involvement at Cooper Park (Dieter -27, Sarah -17). They have the necessary experience, a proven track record, and are dedicated to meeting the Council requirements and improving the environment and customer experience at Cooper Park Tennis Courts.

In an email dated, 11 November from Merrill Witt (addressed to those who had written to the Council about Cooper Park Tennis Courts) Councillor Witt thanked us for taking an interest in Council affairs and said, "your voice makes an important difference". I hope this is true and you will consider the community wishes. I also hope you recognise Dieter and Sarah's incredible commitment, caring and passion as a key differentiator. I urge you to honour the collective voice of our community and grant the Cooper Park Tennis Courts tender to Dieter Wilhelmi and Sarah Morante.

It is my understanding that the council meeting of 8/4/24 will be discussing a recommendation to award the tender for the Cooper Park tennis centre to a group called Young Aces. If this is so then I would like Council to know that I like a number of other people have some concerns regarding this recommendation.

At a previous meeting of Council where another earlier recommendation was discussed members of the public let it be known very clearly that they wanted this tender to go to a local operator and they were led to believe that a 2nd tender process would take place and that local community concerns would be considered when making the next award.

It would seem that community expectations were not heavily considered as this section counted for a lowly 5% of the total point score and all applicants were given a full 5% upfront effectively eliminating this requirement completely. It would be like a handicap race where everybody is given a 5 meter head start.

I am not in a position to know what examination was made regarding the other areas considered. I assume that the expertise of the applicants in actually running the centre to a high standard was looked at as this will be the most important thing in the coming years. It's not much good giving the tender to the group which offers the most money if it transpires that they lack the experience or know how to get the job done.

It would appear that the incumbent team has not been considered. Given that they have been there many years and have run the centre to a very high standard generating a huge amount of public support I for one find this quite puzzling. Both Dieter Wilhelmi and Dr Sarah Morante PhD have vast experience and qualifications when it comes to coaching and have demonstrated by their actions over many years that they know how to manage a facility safely and effectively.

In the next few years a lot of capitol works will be conducted at the centre amongst them new fencing, resurfacing the courts and installing new lights to mention but a few. Dieter and Sarah have done these things in the past, there is no doubt they would be able to do them again. Is this

true of others, have they shown by action and not merely by a statement on a piece of paper that they will be able to perform these tasks.

If the only real consideration in this recommendation to council is money and not ability then the expectations of the community and those of us who love this facility and enjoy the time we spend here will not be met. Even if the offers amount to 40-50K extra and I doubt they would differ by much more than that, such a paltry sum which wouldn't even pay for 1 council employee will not compensate for what we lose if the high bidder turns out to be unable to run it to the same standard we currently enjoy.

I strongly urge Council to consider all factors involved and make a decision based on merit and not the holy dollar, to do anything else will be a bitter disappointment to the community.

## Dear Council Members,

With reference to the Probity Report *Paragraph 4.5 entitled Obtaining Value for money*, I would like to express my support for the team of Sarah and Dieter who have run the Cooper Park Tennis Courts for the past 17 years or so.

The *value for money* that Sarah and Dieter provide can be seen in their commitment to service that goes well beyond what would normally be expected:

They have invested heavily in capital improvements.

The courts and café are are meticulously maintained no matter the weather conditions.

The constant presence of staff members ensures that safety and security are maintained at all times when the courts and café are in use.

The commitment to a well-stocked, friendly and comfortable café provides a place for the whole community to meet, and not just tennis players.

But there are other aspects to *obtaining value for money* that are perhaps less easy to quantify but which, in my view, place the management of the Cooper Park Tennis Centre in a category of its own:

The consideration with which Dieter and Sarah treat their staff, their coaches and their customers creates an atmosphere of mutual respect throughout the centre: people always seem to behave well in this space.

The fact that Dieter and Sarah are both hands-on coaches allows them to really get to know their clients, to follow their progress and to be aware of any health or other issues.

The generosity with which they treat their tennis-playing clients: some tennis centres force players onto court in wet and other risky conditions. Sarah and Dieter willingly allow the players themselves to decide if the courts are playable or not and are quick to offer a refund.

Their personalised booking system is much more expensive to run than an on-line equivalent, but it provides another opportunity for management to better get to know their clients and to advise them of the best courts for their particular requirements.

In short, Sarah and Dieter have *provided value for money* by investing heavily in the infrastructure of the centre, by maintaining its high standards, and importantly by absorbing many costs that other management groups would either not incur in the first place or would pass on to their clients.

Dear distinguished members of the Council,

It is with a heavy heart that I address you to express my profound disappointment in the conduct of our elected representatives and the administrative staff of the Woollahra Council ("Council"). Recent developments surrounding consecutive flawed tenders (SC7193 and SC7818) and the subsequent processes have deeply troubled the local community. These issues have been brought to light in the documented tender and lease, recent Council meetings, documented in meeting minutes, and outlined in the recent Privity Report.

In 2016, the Council valiantly fought against the merger of local councils, rallying behind the community in a battle for survival. Yet, in 2024, that same spirit of unity and protection seems conspicuously absent as the Council has embarked on a distressing course of action. The decision to proceed with two deeply flawed tenders, endangering the existence of the cherished 100-year-old community tennis centre, is a betrayal of the trust placed in the Council by the diverse and loyal residents it serves.

Drawing upon my extensive experience as a successful businessman involved in tender bids across various government levels, I am compelled to highlight the critical importance of community consultation and participation in such endeavours. The Council should have prioritised understanding community expectations and concerns before structuring the tenders. Properly structured tenders with equitable specifications, clear KPIs, and a rigorous qualifying process would have separated genuine contenders from mere pretenders.

During the recent Council meeting, the dismissal of SSMG Voyager and the subsequent appointment of Young Aces after protracted open and confidential deliberations underscored a concerning lack of clarity and informed decision-making. It appears that this decision was more of a compromise to mitigate a challenging situation rather than a well-considered resolution. I firmly believe that the Council should have reconsidered and restarted the tender process to ensure a fair and professional outcome.

My apprehension towards Young Aces' bid stems from its ostentatious financial offer, which raises serious doubts about its viability and long-term sustainability. Will their aggressive investment strategy, prioritising coaching over community access and sustainability, truly serve the best interests of our diverse tennis community? Moreover, their association with Belrose Tennis Centre, known for its coaching-only services, raises concerns about their suitability to manage our cherished tennis centre (references: <a href="https://play.tennis.com.au/BelroseTennisClub">https://play.tennis.com.au/BelroseTennisClub</a> and <a href="https://bonditennis.com.au/about/">https://bonditennis.com.au/about/</a>).

Upon further scrutiny, it becomes evident that significant shortcomings exist within the tender and lease arrangements, warranting immediate attention. The Privity Report, while highlighting financial aspects such as rent (40%), capital expenditure (10%), business plan (10%), and financial capacity (5%), lacks comprehensive information on other essential evaluation criteria. This disproportionate emphasis on financial metrics suggests a concerning disregard for broader community concerns, which constitute the remaining 35% of evaluation criteria not addressed in the report. Furthermore, the recent Council meeting revealed that a mere 5% allocation was made for community interests, a stark departure from the Council's purported commitment to community engagement. Such a disregard for community priorities is deeply regrettable and merits urgent rectification.

I implore the Council to revisit its decisions and safeguard the community's interests with the same fervour demonstrated during the 2016 merger dispute. Transparency, accountability, and genuine commitment to community expectations must guide your actions. Should the Council choose to proceed with the tender process, I stand ready to provide detailed insights into the aforementioned shortcomings and ambiguities.

In conclusion, I urge you to vote against awarding the tender to Young Aces and instead consider a fresh start, ensuring that the process is fair, transparent, equitable, and in the best interests of our cherished community.

# INTRODUCTION

### 1.1 Our Engagement

Procure Group Pty Ltd (Procure) has been engaged by Woollahra Municipal Council (Council) to provide independent probity advisory services in relation to the RFT for the Operating Lease for the Cooper Park Tennis Centre at Bellevue Hill. Further detail regarding our scope of service is included in section 3.

This report sets out our work performed and observations from a probity perspective relating to the procurement process followed by Woollahra Municipal Council, within the context of the framework provided by the NSW Independent Commission Against Corruption's (ICAC) probity fundamentals.

# 1.2 Project Summary

The Council was seeking Tenders from experienced commercial operators to lease, equip, operate, and manage the Cooper Park Tennis Centre located at 1 Bunna Place, Bellevue Hill. A competitive Request for Tender (RFT) process was undertaken, and the RFT was advertised through the Woollahra Municipal Council's website, VendorPanel, and in the Sydney Morning Herald on 30 January 2024 and the Wentworth Courier on 31 January 2024. The RFT was open for a period of 33 days closing at 3.00pm on Friday, 1 March 2024.

At the RFT closing time of 3.00pm on 1 March 2024, Council received 6 Tenders. The RFT Evaluation Panel (EP) has completed its assessment in accordance with the approved Evaluation and Probity Plan and has prepared an Evaluation Report recommending a preferred Tenderer for contract award. The Evaluation Report was finalised and approved by the EP members on 22 March 2024.

#### 2 **CONCLUSION**

Based upon our work performed and detailed in this report, no issues of a probity nature have come to our attention that would lead us to conclude that the process followed by Woollahra Municipal Council in the evaluation of the Tender for the appointment of an appropriately experienced commercial operator to lease, equip, operate, and manage the Cooper Park Tennis Centre located at 1 Bunna Place, Bellevue Hill has not been conducted in a fair and equitable manner with due regard to probity.

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# SCOPE AND METHODOLOGY

### 3.1 Probity Advisor's Role

#### 3.1.1 Role of Probity Advisor

Attachment A provides a detailed description of the role of the probity advisor as well as a definition of probity, taken from relevant publications of the ICAC. In short, a probity advisor is engaged to observe, review, and provide guidance on the integrity of procedures and processes, focusing on the means, rather than the ends, of the project in question.

#### 3.1.2 Probity Fundamentals

In undertaking the probity advisory role, Procure has had regard to the "probity fundamentals" identified by the ICAC. These probity fundamentals are:

- Maintaining accountability and transparency;
- Maintaining impartiality;
- Managing conflicts of interest;
- Maintaining confidentiality; and
- Obtaining value for money.

Further detail describing these probity fundamentals is included in Attachment A.

Section 4 of this report outlines our work performed to monitor the application of the probity fundamentals.

### 3.2 Scope of Work

Procure was engaged on 14 December 2023 by Woollahra Municipal Council to act as probity advisor in regard to the RFT for the Operating Lease for the Cooper Park Tennis Centre at Bellevue Hill. In accordance with our proposal, our scope of work included the following:

- Attend an initial meeting with Council to understand requirements of the project;
- Review and provide comment on the procurement strategy, RFT documents and Evaluation and Probity Plan;
- Review conflict of interest arrangements, review confidentiality arrangements and review records maintained by the
- Attend on site Pre-Tender meeting (including preparation);
- Review and monitor communications with Tenderers throughout the process including addenda and post Tender clarifications:
- Attend evaluation meeting to shortlist Tenderers;
- Attend final evaluation meeting;
- Review Evaluation Report and provide comment from a probity perspective;
- Provide ad-hoc probity advice to address any issues raised that relate to the probity of the process; and
- Attend debriefs with unsuccessful Tenderers.

# 3.3 General Approach Taken

In providing the above services, Procure has employed a range of approaches, including:

- Consideration of relevant Council's Procurement Guidelines;
- Consideration of ICAC Guidelines for managing public sector projects;
- Review of relevant NSW legislation including the Local Government Act 1993 and Local Government (General) Regulation 2021;
- Review of Department of Premier and Cabinet (Local Government) Tendering Guidelines for Local Government;
- Review of and input into relevant RFT documentation to maintain accountability and transparency;
- Provision of advice regarding probity risk assessment in consultation with Woollahra Municipal Council;
- Observation of key meetings, activities, and processes; and
- Discussions with relevant representatives of the project team and provision of advice on issues arising.

# 3.4 Probity Risk Assessment

# **OBSERVATIONS**

### 4.1 Maintaining Accountability and Transparency

In advising and monitoring the process in relation to Maintaining Accountability and Transparency, Procure has undertaken the following tasks:

#### **4.1.1 Pre receipt of Tenders:**

- Noted that the RFT had been advertised on the Woollahra Municipal Council website, VendorPanel, and in the Sydney Morning Herald on 30 January 2024 and the Wentworth Courier on 31 January 2024;
- Noted that Council prepared an Evaluation and Probity Plan for this RFT and was approved by EP members on or before 8 February 2024;
- Attended the mandatory Pre-Tender briefing held on site for registered potential proponents and provided a probity briefing to attendees. Noted that participation at the meeting was a requirement for submitting a conforming Tender. Observed that there were no probity issues raised at the meeting;
- Conducted a probity review of the questions and answers provided for the RFT on the VendorPanel website;
- Confirmed that the Evaluation and Probity Plan for the management of the evaluation of Tenders was developed by Council's Manager Property and Projects with probity advice from Procure. The Evaluation and Probity Plan included, among other things, the following:
  - Introduction including; purpose and objectives of the document;
  - Summary of roles and responsibilities of the EP members, including decision making;
  - Evaluation Protocols;
  - Confidentiality;
  - Conflicts of interest;
  - Record keeping;
  - Communication with proponents;
  - Evaluation process; and
  - Weightings to be applied to evaluation criteria;
- Noted that Council had decided not to publish the evaluation criteria weightings and sub-weightings in the Evaluation and Probity Plan as a measure to ensure their confidentiality and the integrity of the evaluation process;
- Further confirmed and noted that the evaluation criteria weightings and sub-weightings were made available to the EP members upon distribution of the received Tenders and at the EP meeting held on 12 March 2024;
- Noted that membership of the EP comprised persons that appeared to have appropriate skill and experience to conduct the evaluation:
- Reviewed the RFT documentation issued to Tenderers to confirm that evaluation criteria and submission requirements were appropriately documented;
- Reviewed all Council Tender Addendums issued during the RFT period to ensure they met probity requirements; and
- Observed that the evaluation criteria included in the scoring worksheets was used in the assessment of Tenders in accord with the Evaluation and Probity Plan and RFT documentation.

#### 4.1.2 Receipt and evaluation phase:

- Noted that the secure electronic VendorPanel directory was opened on 1 March 2024 and confirmed that six Tenders
- Further noted that Council did not accept any late Tender and the VendorPanel website did not permit submissions after the Tenderer submission deadline;
- Noted that each EP member had undertaken an individual assessment of Tenders and had completed the scoring worksheets prior to attending the EP meeting held on 12 March 2024. Noted that the EP members used an evaluation sheet which outlined the pre-determined selection criteria, as per the Tender documentation, including the mandatory requirements, non-cost criteria and cost criteria;
- Attended the first EP consensus scoring meeting held on 12 March 2024, at which individual EP members were provided with the evaluation criteria weightings and sub-weightings and proceeded to score each Tender against each specified criterion;
- Noted the EP determined that one Tenderer had not attended the mandatory Pre-Tender briefing and had not provided adequate evaluation criteria response information. This Tender was deemed as non-conforming and was not further considered;

- Noted robust discussion amongst EP members, in which individual scores were discussed and initial consensus scores agreed for each Tender;
- Noted that the EP determined to shortlist the highest three scoring Tenders and sought to obtain clarifications from each of the respective Tenderers;
- The EP prepared Tenderer clarifications for each of the shortlisted Tenderers and a probity review was conducted;
- Attended in person clarification interviews conducted by the EP with the 3 shortlisted Tenderers on 14 March 2024. At the conclusion of each clarification interview observed that the EP reconvened and revisited its scoring for each Tenderer against the scoring evaluation criteria. Noted that the EP resolved that for two Tenderers further clarifications were required on the financial information submitted. Noted that the respective Tenderers were asked to provide the additional clarification information;
- Attended the EP meeting held on 19 March 2024 and noted that the EP reviewed the responses to the additional clarification requests submitted by the Tenderers and resolved to finalise consensus scoring of all three shortlisted Tenderers. The EP after deliberation scored each Tenderer and made its recommendation on the preferred Tenderer;
- Reviewed the Evaluation Report prepared by the EP and confirmed that it accurately reflected the evaluation process followed and conclusions of the EP. The Evaluation Report was signed by each member of the EP on 22 March 2024;
- Reviewed the scoring calculations included in the Evaluation Report. No errors were noted; and
- Confirmed through observation of the evaluation process and review of documentation maintained that the EP members at the meetings held on 12 March 2024, 14 March 2024 and 19 March 2024 had followed the Evaluation and Probity Plan in all material respects.

# 4.2 Maintaining Impartiality

In advising and monitoring the process in relation to Maintaining Impartiality, Procure has undertaken the following tasks:

- Confirmed that on 12 March 2024, the EP agreed to seek clarifications in regard to the non-price criteria from the top three shortlisted Tenderers. The request for clarifications did not provide an opportunity to improve each Tenderer's pricing or to improve on responses to non-price criteria;
- Noted that no clarification was sought from the other Tenderers on the basis that these Tenderers did not appear to be in contention at this stage. This assumption was subsequently confirmed at the EP meetings held on 14 March and 19 March 2024;
- Noted that the EP required further clarifications from one of the Tenderers regarding submitted financial information and that this additional information was sought;
- Noted that on 19 March 2024, the EP considered the additional clarification information provided and revised its scoring in accordance with the Evaluation and Probity Plan;
- Confirmed that each Tenderer was assessed against the same evaluation criteria. These criteria were those included in the RFT documentation issued to Tenderers;
- Noted that the highest-ranking Tenderer was recommended for approval;
- Observed the evaluation process and confirmed that the process afforded fair and equitable treatment of Tenderers, in accordance with the Evaluation and Probity Plan; and
- Noted that each member of the EP was present when scoring of Tenders was discussed and agreed and the recommendation was confirmed.

# 4.3 Managing Conflicts of Interest

In advising and monitoring the process in relation to Managing Conflicts of Interest, Procure undertook the following tasks:

- Noted that several emails were received by the probity advisor from members of the public regarding the proposed use and purpose of Cooper Street Tennis Centre and raising issues with regard to a previous RFT process and its compliance with the Local Government (General) Regulation 2021;
- Noted that no probity issues were raised in relation to the current RFT process, and the concerns raised with the probity advisor by the members of the public were passed on to Council for its information and action;
- Confirmed that the EP members had signed individual Conflicts of Interest and Confidentiality Declarations and noted that there were no perceived or actual Conflicts of Interest declared;
- Confirmed at the EP meetings held on 12 and 14 March 2024 that no member was aware of any conflict of interest;
- Confirmed by review of original documents that each of the EP members had signed the Conflict of Interest Declaration document prior to the receipt of Tenders; and
- Confirmed at the final EP meeting held on 19 March 2024, that no member was aware of any conflict of interest.

# 4.4 Maintaining Confidentiality

In advising and monitoring the process in relation to Maintaining Confidentiality, Procure has undertaken the following tasks:

- + Advised the EP members that they were under a general requirement to maintain strict confidentiality and noted that documentation considered to be confidential was kept in restricted access drives;
- + Noted the application and use of confidentiality controls during the distribution of Tenders to EP members and that the restrictions on access were consistent with the Evaluation and Probity Plan;
- + Emphasised confidentiality obligations to EP members when attending the EP meetings on 12, 14 and 19 March 2024;
- + Confirmed at the EP meetings held on 12 and 14 March 2024, that confidentiality requirements during the RFT process were handled in accordance with the Evaluation and Probity Plan and further confirmed that EP members were not aware of any breach of confidentiality;
- Confirmed at the final EP meeting held on 19 March 2024, that EP members were not aware of any breach of confidentiality; and
- + Confirmed that no breach of confidentiality has been brought to the attention of the probity advisor.

# 4.5 Obtaining Value for Money

In advising and monitoring the process in relation to Obtaining Value for Money, Procure has undertaken the following tasks:

- + Noted that rent to Council was a 40% weighted evaluation criterion, providing a comprehensive business plan for operation of the Tennis Centre complex was a 10% weighted criterion, detailed proposals and timing for upgrade of the Tennis Centre, including itemised cost estimates and presentation of the centre including café was a weighted 10% evaluation criterion and financial capacity and viability was a 5% weighted evaluation criterion;
- + Observed at the EP meetings on 12, 14 and 19 March 2024, robust and exhaustive evaluation of all proposals against value for money-based evaluation criteria;
- + Noted that for shortlisted Tenderers the clarification questions sought further details on each Tenderer's financial capacity and resources, and their historical capacity to deliver a comparable tennis centre operation;
- + Noted at the EP meeting held on 19 March 2024, that it was the consensus position that the recommended Tenderer represented best value for money and confirmed with the EP that it had sufficient information necessary to support the decision making process;
- + Noted that the preferred Tenderer's rental offer first year of the Tennis Centre Lease was not the highest, being \$5,000 per annum less than the second ranked Tenderer. However, it was noted the preferred Tenderer scored highest when assessed against the non-pricing criteria;
- + Noted that the preferred Tenderer proposed to invest in the first 5 years in capital works while the second ranked Tenderer proposed to invest ;
- + Noted that the EP had confidence in the preferred Tenderer's pricing since it had an extensive track record in managing comparable sized tennis centres with similar demographics which included a track record of operating cafes and kiosks;
- + Noted that the EP conducted reference checks with other nominated Councils for the preferred Tenderer and that all referees highly supported the preferred Tenderer's experience and capability in running tennis centres and indicated that it has undertaken major capital investment and complied with contractual obligations. Further it was confirmed that the preferred Tenderer repaired and maintained tennis centres in good condition; and
- + Noted that the Evaluation Report included considerations regarding rental, pricing, capital investment including for the Tennis Centre, fit out of the kiosk and the operation and maintenance of the Tennis Centre generally and demonstrated that the preferred Tenderer overall represents best value for money.

# Attachment A – Key Terms & Definitions

Key Terms	Definition
Probity Advisor	In its publication 'Probity and Probity Advising' (November 2005) the ICAC describes a probity advisor as:  "an individual or organisation engaged to observe, review and provide guidance on the probity framework and/or processes of a project. Agencies use internal or external probity advisors to verify that the processes followed are consistent with government regulations, policies, guidelines and best practice principles. A probity advisor provides opinions and guidance on probity risks and issues that may arise during the process and confirms, in writing, whether the concluded process is consistent with the requirements outlined in a probity plan as well as general probity fundamentals. If probity requirements are not being or have not been met, the advisor identifies the non-conformities and any reasons for these in a written report, and if necessary, suggests solutions and monitors their implementation."
Probity	Probity may be defined as: "integrity, uprightness, honesty" (Macquarie Dictionary). Within the public sector, the word "probity" is often used in a general sense to refer to an "appropriate process". Government seeks to conduct its commercial dealings with integrity. Public officials (and their advisors) must be able to demonstrate high standards of probity while pursuing the stated project objectives.
Maintaining Accountability & Transparency	Public sector accountability requirements are intended to save money, resources and time in the long term and prevent corruption, maladministration and substantial waste of public resources. All persons with responsibilities in relation to a project should be accountable for their actions associated with the project. All key activities and decision-making associated with the project should be recorded.  Transparency helps ensure that a process is conducted with integrity, thus enhancing competition and the delivery of value for money, as well as reducing opportunities for corruption, maladministration and substantial waste of public money. An evaluation process should be applied consistently and conducted in accordance with an appropriate methodology. Processes should be well documented and reviewable.
Maintaining Impartiality	Individuals and organisations involved in preparing and submitting proposals for large public sector contracts often invest considerable time, effort and resources in doing so. In return, they are entitled to expect impartial treatment at every stage of the process. If they do not consider the process to be impartial and honest, they may withhold valuable ideas or be deterred from bidding in the future. Any form of bias, whether driven by personal interests or not, could jeopardise the integrity of the project.
Managing Conflicts of Interest	Conflicts of interest arise when there is a conflict between a public official's public duty and private interests, where those private interests could improperly influence the performance of their official duties and responsibilities. Advisors and other consultants working on the project must comply with public sector conflict of interest requirements.  Failure to declare and/or effectively manage conflicts of interest can damage the integrity of the project, therefore eroding public or market confidence in the outcomes. Inadequate systems for identifying and dealing with conflicts of interest provide opportunities for corruption, maladministration and serious waste of public resources.
Maintaining Confidentiality	Accountability and transparency are fundamental to the work of public sector organisations and public officials. However, there is some information that needs to be kept confidential, at least for a specified period of time, in order to protect the integrity of a process and give private sector participants the confidence to do business with government. This information can include the content of proposals, intellectual property and pricing and profit structures. Importantly, much of the information relating to a project needs to be kept confidential up to the point where a contract is signed.
Obtaining Value for Money	Value for money is achieved by fostering an open competitive environment in which private sector participants can make attractive, innovative proposals with the confidence that they will be assessed on their merits. Lapses in probity often end with one or more parties obtaining unreasonable financial gains at the expense of the public interest.  Value for money does not necessarily mean lowest price. Agencies need to consider non-price elements of proposals (including risk) and devise criteria that allow them to be evaluated.
